PALM SUNDAY, 5th APRIL, 2020.

Dear friends, at this point of Lent, I am usually busy with preparations to mark Holy Week including special services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, then looking forward to celebrating Easter including a service at day break, decorating empty crosses, and joining Christians across the world to celebrate the glory of the resurrection. Despite the changes currently enforced on us, we can still mark key moments at the end of Jesus' earthly ministry: the 'Hosannas' of Palm Sunday, the inception of the simple meal Jesus shared with his disciples and which he continues to share with us through Holy Communion, imagining the pain of his trial and his subsequent death on the cross, before hearing the reaction of those early morning visitors to the empty tomb as they experienced the resurrection. It's my turn to produce the printed devotions this week (overleaf), and through them I invite you join the journey of Holy Week through to Easter using Matthew's Gospel .

'Hosanna' means different things in the Bible, depending on the context. In some, it's simply a word for 'help,' which I imagine is in many of our prayers during this pandemic. The pastoral visitors are continuing to make routine contact with you, so don't hesitate to ask for practical help should you feel you need it. Do reach out to them or to me, please don't be alone: even Jesus cried out for help on the cross. 'Hosanna' is also an expression of blessing and praise, and I have been blessed by the conversations and contact I've had in the past couple of weeks, not least hearing about the fellowship and friendship which is being shared on many levels, assuring us of God's love even in the midst of this difficult season.

The well-being of all those involved in our church life and the wider community continues be the highest priority, so I hope and pray that this finds you well alongside those close to you. In the name of Jesus, the heart of all love.

This week you are asked to pray for the following people and their families:-

This weeks Lectionary readings are: Isaiah 50.4-9a; Psalm 118.1-2,19-29; Philippians 2.5-11; Matthew 21.1-11

For this week's devotions, you will need a Bible, open at Matthew 21:1-11, something representing a palm branch or coat, to imagine those strewn ahead of Jesus as he entered Jerusalem; and somewhere in your home or garden to relax as you use these devotions.

Jesu, Jesu, fill us with Your love, show us how to serve the neighbours we have from you.

Lent 6. On our journey through Lent, we remind ourselves about the road Jesus took, one of pain and suffering, yet self giving love, and his suffering challenges us to respond. Today we recall the palm branches and clothing strewn on the road as Jesus entered Jerusalem on a journey that would end in him losing his life. We remember all who are grieving today, thinking of those who are travelling the difficult journey of loss. **We pray together:** Lord Jesus, as you suffered, so many in our world still suffer today. Challenge us to make a difference through our actions and our prayers. Amen

'Be still for a moment; open your senses to all that is around you; be aware of all that sustains you in life.'

PRAY: Lord God, let us approach with shouts of praise: hosanna in the highest! Let us draw close to you on this day that caused disturbance and disruption. Let us approach the throne of the one who came as a humble servant, who came to set us free, to change things for ever. Hosanna to the one who comes in the name of the Lord. Amen!

READ: Matthew 21.1-11

ASK: What's familiar about this for me? What's new or different for me as I read this account? Is there anything I would like to share with someone about it? If you are with family members, share your thoughts. If you are alone, why not call a friend and share those thoughts now, or later?

IMAGINE: ... the following, which explores the bible reading. If you are alone, try reading it aloud with different voices (only God will know!) If you are with family members, share the parts out and read.

James and Andrew enter nervously.

James: Are you sure this is the right place?

Andrew: This is where Jesus said.

James: Well I am not used to donkeys. I am better with boats – they don't kick!

Andrew: (pointing off stage) Look over there! See the donkey and the foal? That must be

them.

The owner enters, making Andrew and James start with fright.

Owner: Did I hear you guys want a donkey? Andrew: Yes, sir. Err...just to borrow.

Owner: You weren't thinking of nicking those two over there?

James: Not nicking...borrowing?

Owner: Perhaps you'd like to borrow a horse instead. I own horses as well. Andrew: Oh no. The Master was quite specific. It was that donkey and her foal.

Owner: So, did your Master give you a password?

James: A password?

Andrew: (whispering) Of course he did, James! James: Oh! He said, 'the Lord has need of it'.

Owner: Then the Lord shall have it. Come with me and I'll introduce you to them, Mr

All depart. The sound of donkey hooves is heard.

READ AGAIN: Matthew 21.1-11 then ASK AGAIN: What's changed as you read the story again? If you are with family members, share your thoughts. If you are alone, why not call a friend and share those thoughts now, or later?

A CONCLUDING THOUGHT: In choosing a donkey, Jesus is a stark contrast to kings and generals who would prefer horses and chariots. Just as he was challenged in the wilderness at the start of his ministry, Jesus might well have been tempted to act differently as he entered Jerusalem nearing its end, perhaps with the hope of becoming the political leader that so many hoped for. Yet, once more, he acts out his liberating leadership, entering the city as a humble peacemaker, riding a working animal with her foal, symbols of the everyday and of weakness. Shouts of *Hosanna!* welcome this new order, the people hungry for righteousness and mercy. As the journey turns towards the cross, the Isaiah reading also reminds us of the cost of vocation, never more so than in Jesus (stated in Philippians 2.5-11).

'LORD, GRACIOUSLY HEAR US': offer some prayer, then finish with the Lord's Prayer.

BLESSING: 'The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face shine on you and be gracious to you; the Lord turn his face toward you and give you peace.' Amen (Numbers 6:24ff, NIV)

FOR THE WEEK AHEAD: Why not read the account Jesus' journey to the cross, a chapter per day from Matthew's Gospel, starting with Chapter 22 on Monday, 23 on Tuesday, ... Read ahead a little so that you get as far as Chapter 26v30 on Maundy Thursday, then read from there to the end of Chapter 27 on Good Friday, have a break on Saturday, before reading Chapter 28 on Easter Sunday.
