Sunday, 22nd November, 2020.

Look out the window at any time of day and you can usually tell what season it is. Our local weather might not always be the best indicator, but other things give it away, especially trees. Trees are remarkable parts of the natural world and have been held sacred by many cultures for many centuries. Look at a deciduous tree and you will see it either in blossom, in full leaf, losing leaves, or bare. This tells us what season we are in, where in the rhythm of the year we are. For ancient Celtic cultures the seasons and cycles of the natural world were not only part of their livelihood, but it was all also interwoven into their spirituality alongside their everyday life. There was no separating the physical from the spiritual, the sacred from the secular: everything was spiritual.

Much natural rhythm this year has been impacted by the pandemic, and as we prepare to mark Advent and celebrate Christmas, many of the usual things we do will not be possible. In the past week or so, I've picked up on several conversations about putting up Christmas decorations early, a sign of yearning for something familiar. But for those who do so, will that glitz wear off before Christmas arrives? Within the rhythm of Christian tradition is the season of Advent, a time of expectant preparation before the joyous and wonderful celebration of Christmas.

So I invite you to embody this time of preparation, getting ready to open our eyes, minds and heart. Let's allow ourselves to live out the rhythm of this time of the year, shrouded in darkness but ready to accept the light of Christ. As the Apostle Paul said "...by taking a long and thoughtful look at what God has created, people have always been able to see what their eyes as such cannot see: eternal power, for instance, and the mystery of his divine being" (Romans 1:20 from *The Message*). Where better to start than by looking out of the window and appreciating that which is around us, ever changing and preparing for what comes next?

Appeal Gifts. You are requested this year to make Christmas parcels for guests are:

The Centre currently has no need for clothing, woolly hats, scarves or gloves. Donations, under current lockdown guidelines, can be taken to the Centre Mondays to Wednesdays between 9.30am and 11.00 am. They need to be at the Centre (Lincoln Street, Lawrence Hill, Bristol, BS5 0BJ) by Monday, 14th December at the latest.

Even though the future looks uncertain, the local charity SIXTY-ONE plans to go ahead with this year's Christmas Gift Project, giving bags of simple gifts to the 1,500 prisoners in HMP Bristol, Leyhill and Ashfield. This is only possible because of the brilliant support received from the prisons and local churches. This year Horfield Baptist church is allowing us to use their space to store the gifts - a huge thank you to Sarah and the team. Normally the churches who pack the gift bags provide the majority of the funding for this project. But this year some will not be able to do so, as they will not be holding the usual Christmas service collections (including members at Bishopston Methodist Church). Can you help make up the shortfall by making a donation towards these costs (each bag costs about £6)? Many prisoners will have spent the vast majority of the last eight months locked in their cell, so it is more important than ever to reach out to them this year. You can donate via

This week's lectionary readings are:

Ezekiel 34: 11 – 16 & 20 - 24; Psalm 95: 1 - 7a *or* Psalm 100; Ephesians 1: 15 - 23; and Matthew 25: 31 - 46.

Reflection on Matthew 25: 31 - 46 by John Hopper (Horfield) - The Judgement of the Nations.

Our reading from Matthew tells of the end of time when all will be judged by Jesus. Jesus uses the image of a shepherd who sorts out the sheep from the goats. There will be a separation of those people who have done good things, and those who have failed to do good things. The image is about judgement – the judgement of all people, everywhere and from all times. Judgement is something we tend not to think about in this day and age. But it is part of the Gospel message, and we should not ignore it.

We should perhaps begin by recognising the plight of the poor old goat. The sheep seem to get all the praise. Of course, goats are not worse animals than sheep. Shepherds did separate sheep from the goats as sheep tolerate cold better than goats. So shepherds put goats in a protected spot, while the sheep continued to forage. For the readers of the book of Matthew this would have been a familiar.

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus is coming to the end of his teaching, before he goes to Jerusalem where He will be crucified. As He concludes this teaching session it is as though Jesus is shown by Matthew to say "Look! what I have said is serious. This is important. Listen to what I say because there are consequences". It was not just for fun. God notices what goes on. God does indeed believe that the lives we lead here on earth are of consequence, and so our behaviour has serious consequences. The way in which we treat others is important to God. He takes note and, at the end, there is judgement.

The good news is that the challenge which Jesus gives can be fulfilled by anybody, by every one. Jesus simply tells his followers to be kind to one another - look after the poor, visit the sick, give food to the hungry, visit those in prison. We have heard it all before. In other words, love your neighbour. We can all do this. It is in doing so that we become a part of God's family.

Jesus is stressing the need for us to take His teaching seriously. How we behave now is important. In so much as people show kindness and mercy, they demonstrate the presence of God within them and live by the standards of His kingdom. They are to "Love one another, as I have loved you". Through their behaviour, they make themselves citizens of that kingdom of Jesus today, as the 'friends of Jesus', they become Christ's sheep.

The faithful see everyone as a brother or sister in Christ and respond in love to the need to care for all God's children, everywhere.

As for us, we know that we too are called to the service of others. We too are called to work to change oppressive systems and human structures that fail to serve the needy. We too are called to work towards relieving troubled lives and broken sprits. God's calls us to take the resources He has given to us and to use them for the good of all.
