Almighty God, you are always working,

Let us pray for those, including ourselves, whom God is using to work his field, being partners in all he is working to bring about growth, new life and fruitfulness (pause).

Loving God, as we remember all who are working for the common good, we pray that you would strengthen the weary, inspire those with responsibility and fill your people with your Spirit, that your Kingdom may come on earth, as in Heaven. Amen.

DEVOTIONS FOR THIS WEEK

Reflection on the Lectionary. Jeremiah 31: 31 - 34; Psalm 51: 1 - 12; Hebrews 5: 5 - 10; John 12: 20 - 33

This week's reflection is provided by Local Preacher Rachel Spencer (SBMC, Knowle)

John 12:20-33

Sunday 21 March is Census Day. In the 2011 census, 60% of respondents acknowledged that they were Christian. That's interesting - imagine if all of those people came to church! Humanists UK disagree with the wording of the religion question, claiming that it presumes that everyone has a religion and leads to people choosing one on the basis of cultural background rather than genuine belief. Your answer to this question may be straightforward but I think it gives us an opportunity to consider what it means to say that we are Christian, if that is how you see yourself. And it comes only two weeks before Easter, when we remember the events that are central to our identity as followers of Christ.

What does today's gospel reading remind us about what it means to be a Christian? Jesus uses the image of a grain of wheat. Perhaps this is a metaphor that you will easily understand if you are a gardener. It is astonishing when you consider the life and beauty that comes from tiny seeds. You plant something small, that looks dead, into the soil and you wait. For days or even weeks you wait and see whether anything will grow.

From The Message translation, 'Anyone who holds on to life just as it is destroys that life. If you let it go, reckless in your love, you'll have it forever, real and eternal'. It takes bravery to do that. To give everything to God and to be prepared to give up even the parts of our lives that we love most, to wait and see what God plans for us. Perhaps there are parts of us that we're not quite ready to allow to die. Maybe it will only be by trusting God completely, and with everything, that we will open ourselves to the tremendous possibilities for growth that he offers. Maybe the growth and life that come from such self-sacrifice will bear fruit that others will notice. Maybe that will bring people to us, as they did to the disciples with Jesus, saying, 'We want to see Jesus'. In this reading Jesus talks of his imminent death, saying, "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." Our calling is to enable others to see Jesus that they might also die to their old lives and grow, instead, in the love of God.

I expect that most of those who will tick the 'Christian' box on the census will not be prepared to go to these extremes; to give up everything to follow Jesus. As we journey through these last days towards Easter let us reflect on how much of ourselves we are prepared to give to the one who gave everything for us on the cross.
