Easter Sunday - Halleluiah, He is risen indeed

It's quite possible you will be reading this before Easter Sunday, perhaps even on Maundy Thursday or Good Friday, days on which our focus is the last days of Jesus' earthly life. It seems premature to wish you a Happy Easter with that in mind, but drawing on the testimony of those at Jesus' tomb, I pray that we can share the transforming experience of death becoming new life, the centre of God's story in Jesus.

It's happened. The worst. We've lost our Jesus. He warned us, but when he was there with us, we couldn't believe what he was saying. Death - taking Jesus? It seemed impossible.

And yet, here we are, by his tomb ... waiting to anoint his body and say goodbye. I can't bear to look Peter or John in the eye, there's so much suffering and loss – and guilt. Judas is dead, too, but it doesn't feel the same as losing Jesus. And yet... is it really the end? When he told us he'd die, he also said he would rise again. That was just as far-fetched as the idea of him leaving us. But I've seen him do so many impossible things, he's changed my life in so many inconceivable ways – could he really do it? Dare I hold onto the hope that I might see him again? Part of me wants to bury that memory away with his body, to forget he ever spoke those words. To hope and to be disappointed would be too much, I couldn't bear it. And yet, could he really come back to us? Might he really come and set things right? Is it possible to leave this sadness and bitterness behind and rebuild a new life with Jesus still at the centre? I feel like hope is there, just over the horizon, silent and still, but there ...

And yet...

...here we are, by his tomb...he said he would rise again...I've seen him do so many impossible things ...could he really do it...has he really come back...to set things right...hope is here...it's happened!

#### DEVOTIONS FOR THIS WEEK

This week's Lectionary readings are Isaiah 25: 6-9, Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24, Acts 10:34-43, Mark 16:1-8

Our reflection is provided by Local Preacher Christine Stones (Victoria).

The ending to Mark's gospel differs from the other gospels, there are no encounters with the risen Christ. Mark's original finishes with the words, 'for they were afraid.' Was there more which was lost? Was Mark unable to complete his task because of persecution and martyrdom? Yet this original apparent abrupt ending provides much to reflect on.

It starts with three women, Mary Magdala, Mary the mother of James, and Salome approaching Jesus' tomb with spices. In the previous chapter, Mark has mentioned that there were women, including these three, among Jesus' followers. They'd looked after Jesus and travelled with him to Jerusalem. They are the only identified group of Jesus' followers watching the crucifixion.

The normal burial rite of anointing with spices had not been able to take place before the entombment and was delayed further until after the Sabbath. In practical terms such delayed anointing was pointless, but the women in their grief wanted to express their devotion to Jesus. The women worry about whether they will be able to move the heavy stone, informing the reader that the grave had been effectively sealed. They arrive to find the stone removed and to their alarm, the tomb containing not the dead body of Jesus but an angelic figure who gives them startling news: Jesus has been raised from the dead and has gone ahead to Galilee where they will see him. They are entrusted with this amazing message to give to the disciples and to Peter, emphasising that Peter is still counted as one of the disciples in spite of his denial. Do the women rush off rejoicing to share this wonderful news with the disciples? No! 'They fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them. And they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid!'

At Jesus arrest it was the male disciples, named and written about in the earlier chapters of Mark that had, in terror, fled or denied any connection with him. They do not appear to be at the crucifixion. The women were not scared of being present at the crucifixion, perhaps their lives were less at risk. They were not afraid to stay with the suffering, the acute pain and grief of witnessing their beloved Jesus dying in agony. Yet they flee from the hope and promise of the empty tomb and the angelic message.

We know of course, that at some point, they did share the hope and joy of Easter. Sometimes we can become so overwhelmed with pain, death and distress that we cannot dare to hope. In the past twelve months we have seen countless images of suffering, death and destruction of people and of the planet. The good news of Easter Day is that God raised Jesus to new life, revealing self-giving love triumphs over evil, destruction and death. Jesus goes ahead, calling us to follow and share in his mission of love to transform broken humanity and creation into their God intended wholeness.
