In 2019, the Methodist Conference discussed the church's approach to marriage and relationships in a report 'God in Love Unites Us,' which was commended for consultation in local churches, circuits and District Synods (the Methodist Church's regional forums). The report included sections about the qualities of good relating, an understanding of cohabitation, celebration of civil partnerships, prayers following the end of a marriage and permission in principle for same-sex marriages to take place in Methodist church premises. This process of consultation has now concluded, with the final discussions at District Synods having taken place in the last few weeks.

Some find the proposed changes difficult to accept, but discussions have largely been conducted in an atmosphere of mutual respect, thanks to careful work on the report itself and at the 2019 Conference. The Conference will again discuss this key report when it meets at the end of June, taking into account the feedback from churches, Circuits and Districts, before making final decisions on the report. It is hoped that the consciences of all church members and ministers will continue to be respected, whatever their views on these important subjects, particularly the proposal to allow same-sex marriages to take place in Methodist Churches.

Personally speaking, I hope that we can live out our belief that the gospel message is for all so that everyone, whatever their gender, sexuality, race, skin colour, age, social background, life experience, (...) is included fully within God's church, a community of love, safety and equality for all.

Please join with me in prayer for members of the Conference, and indeed for the Methodist Church as a whole over the coming weeks with this important topic in mind. Rev Patrick

I am the true Vine". John 15:1-8

Reflection on the Lectionary 2 May. Psalm 22:25 - 31; Acts 8:26 - 40; 1 John 4:7 - 21; John 15:1 - 8

This week's reflection is provided by Local Preacher, Adam Biddlestone (Zion).

Led by the Spirit, Philip found himself in the right place at the right time to engage in conversation and share the good news of Jesus Christ. In those days people tended to read aloud, so Philip would have overheard and recognised what the Ethiopian eunuch was reading.

At the beginning of Acts (1:8), Jesus commissions his disciples to, 'be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea, in Samaria and to the ends of the earth.' This encounter with the Ethiopian eunuch comes immediately after Philip had spent time preaching in Samaria and Ethiopia was at the time considered to be 'the ends of the earth.' Philip's encounter with him led to him preaching the good news.

We are told very little about the eunuch apart from his nationality and role. A eunuch as a castrated male was a real outsider. Ethiopians considered matters of administration to be beneath their Kings, so the Queen took on this role. Eunuchs were often appointed in charge of the treasury as they would not be tempted by the Queen. Clearly this eunuch was an educated man, in a position of power and trust. He was most likely a 'god-fearer' who worshipped the God of Israel but was treated as though he were a Gentile, denied full access to the Temple, permitted only to enter the Court of the Gentiles. He was clearly a man of means, with his own chariot and scrolls of scripture.

'Do you understand what you are reading?' Philip asks him. 'How can I, unless someone explains it to me?' replies the eunuch. We are not told of any introductions or attempt for the two men to 'break the ice,' they launch straight into exploring the passage of Scripture. Philip is able to answer the eunuch's question, end his confusion about who Isaiah is talking about (Isaiah 53 verses 7 - 8) and instruct him that Isaiah's words are not pointing to himself but the Jesus. This leads the eunuch to a point he has most likely been waiting for, he now believes and want to mark that belief through Baptism, 'What can stand in the way of my being baptised?' he asked Philip. Philip responds and the eunuch is baptised in the Holy Spirit.

How often are we brave enough to open a conversation with, 'Do you understand what you are reading (hearing)?' or 'How can I understand unless someone explains it to me?' Recent initiatives from the Methodist Church, including a year of testimony, Time to Talk of God, encourage us to engage in conversation with others, how often do we take that opportunity? The commission of Jesus to his disciples in Acts 1: 8 passes down through the generations of disciples to us, 'you will be my witnesses in Horfield, Kingswood, Patchway, Thornbury and in all Bristol and South Gloucestershire.'

Prayer, Loving God, we thank you for opportunities to share in conversation with others about our faith. As we ask questions and provide answers, may we continue to grow in faith, develop relationships and community. Amen
