Be aware. You may have seen reports in the media about scam emails apparently coming from church ministers. The sorts of things that are included might be 'Hi, can you help me?' or 'I need to talk to you later, can you let me know when you are free?' The next email often asks for gift cards (e.g. Amazon) to give to an imaginary family member. It's potentially easy to be drawn into these requests because they seem genuine, as do the email addresses which can be set up to look as if they are real. Eco-Tip. A common misconception is that aluminium foil cannot be recycled. In Bristol, aluminium foil can definitely go in your green recycling box with other metals. However, small bits of metal can often get stuck or lost through the recycling processor.

TIP: Bristol Waste recommend saving up little bits of aluminium foil and keeping them scrunched together at least 5cm across - ideally the size of a tennis ball Ponce you have a decent-sized ball of foil, put it in your green box for kerbside recycling.

EXTRA TIP: using a foil case from a pie or quiche can be handy to keep those little bits together inside. REMEMBER: the aluminium foil needs to be clean of food residue before you put it out for collection. Learn which metals can be recycled here: https://bristolwastecompany.co.uk/metal-matter

Reflection on the Lectionary Sunday 13 June

Psalm 20; 1 Samuel 15: 34 - 16: 13; 2 Corinthians 5: 6-17; Mark 4: 26 - 34.

This week's reflection is provided by Local Preacher and Church Pastor, Kevin Marshall.

1 Samuel 15: 34 - 16: 13

We all sometimes have our ideal candidate or person for a job and think that person would be the best and only person for the job. The person is well suited with brains or brawn or a combination of both. Or perhaps the person has the most experience or experience of a particular type. This can lead to us thinking that there is only one possibility but sometimes we do not see deep enough or properly. We perhaps only see the outward signs or only the experience that we think is needed. Yet, in reality there is often a need to see deeper and weigh up more options. This is what we are going to read about today.

The story of choosing a King to replace Saul is a famous story of the Old Testament. Saul had let God down; he had not obeyed God and had not destroyed all the animals of the Amalekites and He had not killed the King of the Amalekites, Agag and had saved the best of the animals for himself. This means that God tells Samuel that He no longer trusts Saul and wants him as King. God wants Samuel to anoint a new king whom God will choose and show Samuel who it is. God asks Samuel to go to the House of Jesse in Bethlehem and there he will find the one whom God wants him to anoint as the new King. Samuel questions God as to how he is going to be able to travel for if Saul hears of it, he will kill Samuel. But God tells him that if he takes a heifer(cow) and says he is going to use it as a sacrifice he can go to the House of Jesse in safety. So, Samuel does as God commands him and goes to the House of Jesse in Bethlehem.

When Samuel arrives the people are scared and ask him why he has come, so he tells them that he has come to make a sacrifice and to meet Jesse and his sons and to consecrate with the sacrifice of the heifer. Then we read the familiar story of the seven sons in the house being brought before Samuel one at a time and Samuel expecting God to tell him to anoint one of them as they stand before him. But God doesn't tell Samuel to anoint any of them. So, Samuel is confused, so asks Jesse is this all of his sons and Jesse replies that there is still the youngest who is looking after the sheep. So, Samuel asks for the youngest to be brought before him and he sees he is glowing with health, has a fine appearance and handsome features. God immediately tells Samuel to rise and anoint him for he is the one. Samuel takes his horn of oil and anoints David and from that day the Spirit of the Lord came powerfully upon Him whose name was David (1 Samuel 16 v12-13).

The story ends there for Samuel moves on to Ramah. So, this story shows us that we must look deeper and ask God's guidance and pray that He will show us the correct choice and option. AMEN.
