Beavers have been locally extinct in the UK for many years but, recently, they have been reintroduced in just a few locations as an ecological experiment. Beavers work as a community, creating a lodge and dam that provides their family space and shelter. And in felling trees and making dams, they change the landscape, creating new wetland habitats for themselves, and for plants and other animals in the surrounding countryside. They bring new light and space and improve water quality.

Of course, not everyone wants their land flooded or trees cut down, so they have their detractors too. It will be interesting to see how the experiment works out in years to come. Leaving aside those ecological arguments and details, the broad description of beavers at work might be a helpful analogy for the church - a place to provide a community, somewhere to gather, and a place of shelter or sanctuary. Whatever our Christian experience, we are called to serve and transform the places where we live and move, flooding them with God's unconditional love, bringing the light of Christ into people's lives, and hoping to improve the quality of those lives.

In recent weeks, in the season of 'Creationtide,' we've been reflecting on our response to the forthcoming COP26 summit which begins on 31 October. As the summit approaches, can I invite you to spend some time offering that transforming love in prayer. You can do that individually, but there will also be a chance to join in with a circuit initiative to pray in the days running up to the start of the summit, including at Horfield Methodist Church on Saturday 23 October, 4-5pm which will also be shared online via Zoom (links below).

Embrace this world, it is a fragile place in need of healing, where arrogance and self-interest seek to undermine your common good, and those in need take second place to those who have.

Embrace this world, wash it in your tears of mercy and love, and bring healing and restoration into its brokenness dear Lord, we pray.

Reflection on the Lectionary 17 October (Ordinary 29)

Psalm 104: 1 - 9; Job 38: 1 - 7, 34 - 41; Hebrews 5: 1 - 10; Mark 10: 35 - 45

Mark 10:35-45

This passage talks of the death and suffering that Jesus will face and of the example that Jesus sets for our day-to-day lives. It comes straight after Jesus has, for the third time, told his disciples that he was going to be put to death. James and John take this as a prompt to ask Jesus for a special place in God's kingdom. They ask to be given the seats of greatest honour. Perhaps they have misunderstood what the kingdom of God is really about!

The world hasn't changed a great deal in two thousand years. People still clamour for status and power. We want to be important. We might not like to admit it, but I expect we all sometimes behave like James and John. We sometimes want, and think we deserve, a special place.

Jesus explains that the way of life among the Gentiles, where the rulers are authoritarian, is not how it is among his disciples, in God's kingdom. Instead, those who wish to be great must serve. All are equal in God's kingdom. The only authority is God. In a society or community where people are individualistic and only seek their own advancement there is unlikely to ever be peace. Only one person can really be in charge, after all. If, instead, all seek to serve one another and recognise the equal value of everyone, there is no need to fight over position or power. In Jesus, we have the ultimate example of a servant. Despite being God, and having every right to assert authority, Jesus tells us that he came not to be served but to serve, even to the point of giving his life. What does it mean to be a servant? It sounds like an out-dated idea. I have been re-watching Downton Abbey recently, a drama about the lives of a wealthy family and their servants in the early twentieth century. Back then, it was common for working people to choose a life 'in service' - working as a maid, a cook, a footman for others. It comes across in the drama that, mostly, the servants understand their place and, far from feeling belittled by that, they are honoured to serve their family. So, how can we have an attitude of feeling honoured to serve one another?

I think it is about looking around us at the needs of our family, our friends, our colleagues, our community; asking ourselves what we can do to enable others to live life to the full. It is important to remember that being a servant is not the same as being a doormat. It does not mean we should look after others at the expense of looking after ourselves. If we are exhausted and uncared for then we will not be able to care for others. And it is also worth remembering that, in most cases, our serving will be small and will go unnoticed by most. As the saying goes, 'We cannot all do great things for the world, but we can all do small things with great love.' Let us look for opportunities to serve God and God's kingdom as we go into the days ahead, seeking not our own honour but the glory of the Lord.
