Sunday, 29th November, 2020.

Advent begins this Sunday, a time of hopeful and expectant preparation as we approach the celebration of Christmas. Amidst the uncertainties which surround us at the moment, I hope and pray that we can all use this time as a way of expressing the deep and lasting hope expressed in Jesus Christ, God who is with us, in all seasons of life. Our worship over the coming weeks will focus each week on one aspect of 'A Methodist Way of Life,' a framework within which we express our relationship with God, both individually and collectively. The focus this week is on Learning and Caring, through which we aspire to help each other grow and learn as Christians, through mutual support and care. That takes shape in many ways, not least in our pastoral support for each other, but also in the way in which we seek to study God's word and bring it to life.

Many of you will be familiar with the work of George Müller, whose reading of the Bible and prayerful life encouraged him to set up orphanages locally in the 19th century, the legacy of which lives on in the Mullers organisation which continues to show Christian hope through the care which it provides for children and young people across the globe today. As we look for encouragement in our own care for each other, here are some words from George Müller's sermon 'The Secret of Prevailing Prayer' (NB 'profit' refers in context to the good outcome from an action or activity, not the monetary interpretation!):

"..let us persevere and go on steadily praying, and be assured that God is both able and willing to do it for us; and that it is the very joy and delight of His heart, for Christ's sake, to give to us all things which are for the glory of His name, and our good and profit."

Bristol Churches Winter Night Shelter. This year we will not be able to host homeless guests at Horfield as we have done over the last two years. Covid restrictions have forced the project into a new way of working. A B&B hotel has been hired for 12 weeks for the guests over the coldest months and various churches are supporting either directly or indirectly. From Horfield a few people will be volunteering at the B&B, but many cannot do that. There are other ways in which people can support this work.

- Prayer support will be co-ordinated by Rev Patrick Stonehewer and he will send email updates to those who are on his list
- Toiletries will be collected once again by children at Horfield CVEC school and we will make sure they are delivered to the B&B.
- Clothing donations may be welcome and more details will follow.

We can also support financially and a number of people have already indicated that they would like to donate to the project. The project has some reserves left from last year, but not enough to fund this year's work so financial support will be very welcome. There are three ways in which you can do that:

Some of the Horfield Christmas offerings at church will also go towards the Night Shelter. I hope you will still feel able to be connected to the Night Shelter Project this year and that, next year, we might be able to host guests again at Horfield with our large and committed team of volunteers! Even though the future looks uncertain, the local charity SIXTY-ONE is going ahead with this year's Christmas Gift Project, giving bags of simple gifts to the 1,500 prisoners in HMP Bristol, Leyhill and Ashfield. This year Horfield Baptist church is allowing the use their space to store the gifts. Normally the churches who pack the gift bags provide the majority of the funding for this project, but this year some will not be able to do so, as they will not be holding the usual Christmas service collections. Can you help make up the shortfall by making a donation towards these costs (each bag costs about £6)? Many prisoners will have spent the vast majority of the last eight months locked in their cell, so it is more important than ever to reach out to them this year. Reflection on the gospel reading is by Christine Stones (Victoria).

In the middle of November, the WhatsApp group for my road began a discussion in response to a resident's question, "How soon can I put up my Christmas lights to bring some cheer to the street?" Today, is the first Sunday in the Church's season of Advent, a time associated with waiting and expectation, when we prepare for the coming of Jesus.

Today's Gospel passage certainly has an air of expectation, something significant is going to happen. But, the impending event is not the coming of the baby Jesus, the passage does not focus on what people associate with the message of Christmas. It starts, "But in those days after that distress..." The chapter is the final speech of Jesus' ministry and is a collection of dire warnings predicting suffering, persecution, disaster and desolation. It contains echoes of the prophetic tradition, where contemporary history and foreseeable events were viewed in the wider context of God's judgment and providence; here events are also linked with end times.

In verses 24 and 25, Mark continues the warnings of an unprecedented event with a stark picture of cosmic disturbance which heralds something very different.

"And then they will see the Son of man coming in the clouds with great power and glory and he will gather the elect from the corners of the earth."

After the devastation, the hopelessness and despair, here is the promise of God finally manifesting his sovereignty and the full realisation of His kingdom, in the coming of his Son. And *this* time the Son will come in glory and power.

Mark's readers, aware of this promise, were grappling with two dangers. Firstly, that as the end had not come at once it would not come and they no longer should be vigilant. Secondly, they struggled with speculation about date and time. These dangers are addressed by Jesus in two parables.

The first parable is about the Fig Tree. Many trees in Palestine were evergreen, but the dormant, seemingly dead, Fig Tree brings promise of new life as its leaves unfurl in spring and in a very short time summer arrives. The message is do not lose hope, be patient and read the signs that will tell you the time is near.

The second parable warns against speculation. Today some people would link devastating events of this year (flood, fire, earthquake and pandemic) with this chapter and use them to predict a date for the end of the world. These extreme events demonstrate humanity's disastrous impact on the natural world, but this passage firmly warns against speculation. No one, not even the Son, knows the day or hour. The disciples, like the second parable's servants, must wait and watch for their master's return. The parable also says that the servants are given tasks by their master and must continue to work. So, we too are called to wait, watch and continue the Master's work.

Prayer.

"God our deliverer, whose approaching birth still shakes the foundations of our world:
